Orange County Education Foundation Surprises Nine Teachers with Grants to Support Innovation

With fanfare to rival Ed McMahon and the Publisher's Clearinghouse Sweepstakes crew, members of the Orange County Education Foundation (OCEF) surprised nine area teachers on Wednesday, May 16 with grants intended to support innovative classroom instruction. The teachers included eight in Orange County Public Schools and one at Grymes Memorial School.

The recipients were selected from 41 teachers who submitted applications as part of the Foundation's second annual teacher innovation grant (TIG) competition. Twenty-one of the applications were carried over after they failed to receive funding from the fall TIG competition co-sponsored by the Foundation and the Lake of the Woods Lions Club. The other 20 applications

were submitted prior to the May 1 deadline for the spring competition.

"The good news is that we have provided funding for nine real innovative projects this year," said Tim Ferguson, chairman of the Foundation's Teacher Innovation Grant Committee. "At the same time, it's sad that 32 other good ideas remained unfunded. There's no doubt that the Foundation Board has its work cut out to encourage more support from our community."

On Wednesday, May 16, however, Ferguson and his Foundation Board colleagues focused their attention on celebrating the winners. Traveling on an Orange County Public Schools bus, the group visited the school of each TIG recipient. While principals were provided advanced notice, the recipients were not so advised. In each case, the OCEF group arrived at each recipient's classroom door with balloons and an over-sized check. Grant awards were made in the presence of each teacher's students. After shock, tears, smiles, hugs, handshakes and photos, the Foundation group left for its next destination. Six grants of \$250 were awarded from the Foundation's Teacher Innovation Grant fund. They were divided into four clusters: grades pre-K-2; grades 3-5; grades 6-8; high school; and a judge's choice category. Another \$250 grant was awarded from the Barbara Hill Fund for Innovative Teaching in Economics and Financial Literacy. Two grants in the amount of \$314 and \$450 respectively were awarded from the Ernestine Reid Fund for Innovative Teaching. The May, 2012 recipients of the Orange County Education Foundation's Teacher Innovation Grants include the following:

<u>Grade pre-K – 2 cluster</u>

Jill Woycik, kindergarten teacher at Locust Grove Primary School (LGPS), intends to use 21st century technology to ensure that every student in her classroom is a fluent reader. In her application, Woycik wrote that she wanted to show how the iPod Touch could be used to introduce beginning sounds, sorting activities and read-along audio books to promote fluency with beginning readers. With the award, LGPS students will be able to use the iPod Touch as another meaningful learning tool.

"I am so grateful to the Foundation for giving me the opportunity to bring technology into the classroom," Ms. Woycik said. "The students will love using the iPod during center time. I cannot wait to look into all the wonderful apps that will reinforce what we are learning."

Grade 3-5 cluster

Erin Shafferman, Gordon Barbour Elementary School music teacher, intends to deepen her students' understanding of music theory while introducing them to the ukulele. The grant will allow Shafferman to add ukuleles to the list of musical instruments available to her students. In her application, Shafferman reported that she wanted treble clef, notes, time signatures and the value of notes to be more than words on a page for GBES music students. She said she wanted those words to come alive

as the students make beautiful music with their brand new ukuleles.

"I greatly appreciate the manner in which the Foundation supports the arts in such a meaningful way," Shafferman said. "The grant will allow me to put a ukulele in each child's hand."

Grade 6-8 cluster

Shyla Vesitis, 6th grade teacher at Grymes Memorial School, intends to help her students become more aware of the Orange community while they develop first-person research skills and learn to use digital story telling equipment. The grant will allow Vesitis to purchase software and materials to support the project.

"Receiving this grant will allow our students to build their research skills while becoming more aware of our community," Vesitis said. She added that she was excited about digital storytelling and felt like the grant would allow her students to use technology to link ideas and build community in meaningful ways.

Jennifer Hudson-Foskett,

Prospect Heights Middle School (PHMS) teacher, intends to expand the reach of the PHMS Garden Club into community gardening. She also wants to expose student participants to the process and value of worm composting. Her grant will enable students to formulate goals and plan their gardens while incorporating math, science and language arts into the Garden Club experience.

"I have always been interested in gardening and I have used gardening with students in the past," said Hudson-Foskett. "I find that it provides a

context for learning. It connects students to school. But even more than that gardening extends to family life. It brings school into the home and the home into school."

High School cluster

Sandi Terry, Orange County High School English teacher, will purchase a digital camera that will be used by student staff members of the high school's literary magazine, *Collage*. The magazine highlights student skill, creativity, and achievement in the areas of writing and art. The grant will provide a fresh and more professional look to Collage, according to Terry's application.

Judges' Choice cluster

Michele Reuss, Lightfoot Elementary School (LES) teacher, proposed a plan for a "Magical Night of Reading" program intended to encourage and support LES students as they mature into lifelong readers. The program will allow students to dress like their favorite book character while they enjoy dinner with their parents at LES. Following dinner, the students and their families will engage in various student-led activities, such as reader's theater, book talks, author's chair and reading games. Each student also will receive a free book for their participation in the program.

"I am overwhelmed by the recognition," said Reuss. "Receiving the award for the *Magical Night of Reading* is so special. It's such a powerful event for Lightfoot Elementary School and the have the Orange County Education Foundation's support means so much to me but even more to the LES community. Thank you so much."

Barbara Hill Fund for Innovative Teaching in Economics and Financial Literacy

Mary Freeman, Orange County High School teacher, received the first-ever Barbara Hill Grant for Innovative Teaching in Economics and Financial Literacy. The award will allow her

students to conduct on-line and inclass research related to the purchase of a vehicle. Students will be introduced to such tools as the Kelly Blue Book and NADA web sites where they can determine market value while they factor in down payments, monthly payments and finance charges, as well as registration and license fees. After completing their research, students will participate in a field trip to a local car dealership where they will meet with dealership personnel and review their decision-making process. They also will be able to apply their

new-found knowledge to the evaluation of new automobiles at the dealership.

Ernestine Reid Fund for Innovative Teaching

Lori Barden, Orange County High School teacher, received one of two first-ever Ernestine Reid Grant for Innovative Teaching. The award will allow her to purchase Smart Board technology that will enable students to gain experience with writing checks, reconciling checking accounts and completing federal and state Income tax forms. "The fact that it is named after Ernestine Reid makes this grant award even more special," Barden

Karen McKean, guidance counselor at Gordon Barbour Elementary School (GBES), received the second Ernestine Reid grant. The grant will support the implementation of a schoolwide character education program at GBES. According to McKean's application the program will be based on the six pillars of character: trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship. The funds will cover the cost of the Character Counts curriculum materials, as well as posters and other visual aides to support character development.

"I have so much respect for Ernestine Reid," said McKean. "I am

honored to receive this award. The *Character Counts* curriculum will be a great compliment to the bullying prevention program we have in place. *Character Counts* will increase our students' awareness of positive character traits here at Gordon Barbour and in our community!"
